#### GLOSSARY

- **APPROPRIATION:** An authorization granted by a Town Meeting to make expenditures and to incur obligations for specific purposed. An appropriation is usually limited in amount as to the time when it may be expended. Only a Town meeting or the School Committee can authorize money appropriated for one purpose to be used for another. Any amount which is appropriated may be encumbered (see definition).
- **AVAILABLE FUNDS:** Free cash, reserves and unexpended balances available for appropriation.
- **COLLECTOR:** Is responsible for the overall administration of local taxes. The Collector enforces the tax laws to insure a high level of voluntary payment and is responsible for properly maintaining tax records, accounting for taxes received, and paying over all receipts to the Treasurer.
- **ENCUMBRANCES: .....** Obligations in the form of purchase orders, contracts or salary commitments which are chargeable to the appropriation and for which a part of the appropriation is reserves.
- **ESTIMATED RECEIPTS:** Estimate of money to be received by the Town from various sources, such as licenses, state reimbursements, etc. The estimate is deducted by the Assessors from the gross amount to be raised by taxes when the tax rate is set.
- EXCESS AND DEFICIENCY: Also called the "surplus revenue" account, this is the amount by which case, accounts receivable and other assets exceed the liabilities and reserves. It is akin to the "stockholders equity" account on a corporation balance sheet. It is not; however, available for appropriation in full because of a portion of the assets listed as "accounts receivable" may be taxes receivable and uncollected. (See "Free Cash")
- **FISCAL YEAR:** A twelve-month period commencing July 1 to which the annual budget applies and at the end of which a Town determines its financial position and the results of its operations.
- FREE CASH: Certified each July 1 by the Director of Accounts, this is the surplus revenue account (Also called "excess and deficiency") less any uncollected taxes of prior years. It is available for appropriation upon certification. By action of a Special Town Meeting after certification and before setting the tax rate, part or all of any unexpected "free cash" may be applied to reduce the tax rate of the current year. (See also "Excess and Deficiency"). "Free Cash" is also referred to as "Available Funds."
- **OVERLAY:** Amount of money raised by Assessors for purpose of creating a fund to cover abatements and uncollectible taxes.
- **RESERVE FUND:** Amount transferred from Overlay and/or appropriated for unforeseen or emergency purposes. Controlled by the Finance Committee and Board of Selectmen.
- **ROAD MACHINERY FUND:** A fund which is the accumulated town charge for certain uses for town equipment and which may be appropriated for maintenance and repair of that equipment.
- SURPLUS REVENUE: The amount by which the cash, accounts receivable and other floating assets exceed the liabilities and reserves.
- **SPECIAL TOWN MEETING:** A meeting of the registered voters of a Town called by the Board of Selectmen at their discretion or by written request of 20% of all registered voters in the Town.
- TOWN MEETING WARRANT: A written order calling the annual or a special town meeting and containing a list of the subjects to be acted upon. The Selectmen shall insert in the warrant for the annual Town Meeting all subjects which are requested in writing by ten or more registered voters and in the warrant for a Special Town Meeting all subjects requested by 10% of all the Town's voters.

#### REPORT OF THE BLANDFORD ARTS COUNCIL

This has been a challenging year for the arts in Massachusetts. The Blandford Arts Council received state funding from Mass. Cultural Council for \$2000, representing a 61% reduction from the previous year. However, the Council set its priorities to assist locally based artists and organizations followed by Hilltown artists.

The Blandford Arts Council was able to provide grant funding to the Blandford Fair Art Show, the White Church, Henry Lappen, a juggler, and Patty Carpenter, for performances in Blandford. Grants to organizations located in the Hilltowns included the miniature theatre of Chester, the Huntington Dance Co., the North Hall presenting the Festival of Hilltown Artists, Kathleen Nesbitt, a writer from Granville, and the Sevenars in Worthington.

The members of the Arts Council believe that the Arts in the Hilltowns improve the quality of life in our communities. We urge all residents to participate in the arts as a member of the Council, a volunteer for events, and most importantly as an audience member. Support your local arts organizations and artists. Your reward will be a life changing experience.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS

This year the Board of Assessors consists of Donald Blanchette, Chairman, Jeni Masiuk and Laura Lee Bertram. Jeni attended the annual MAAO school at the University of Massachusetts, and has been certified as an Assessor by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Laura Lee Bertram joined the Board when she was appointed Acting Principal Assessor by the Selectmen. Laura Lee brings with her a vast knowledge of assessing and related fields. Also new in the office is the Assistant to the Board, Alicia Brazie. Alicia has open office hours Monday evenings 7-9, and Tuesday mornings 9-1. She is in the office most mornings, (except Friday), and is happy to assist you if you call ahead.

We deeply regret the resignations of Jared Heeter and Debra Forish. Both were dedicated to the well-being of the Town of Blandford.

The triennial revaluation has been completed with an average property increase of 24%. The tax rate for fiscal year 2004 has been set. The tax rate has decreased by 21.6%. Both the revaluation and the tax rate were approved by the Massachusetts Department of Revenue.

At a special town meeting, Massachusetts General Law Chapter 59, Section 5, Clause 17C was accepted. This reduces some of the eligibility requirements for the elderly and surviving spouse exemption which will allow more people to qualify. Any questions regarding exemptions should be directed to the Assessors' office.

The Board of Assessors is always available to answer valuation and assessing questions. The Board meets on the first and third Thursdays of each month, excluding holidays. Changes are posted on the town bulletin board.

#### REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The open space plan is near completion, the BBC is working on the final draft. The open space in Blandford continues to grow. The Springfield Water and Sewer Comm. Has acquired 3 parcels with conservation restriction: Dover Trust (130 acres), LaBomard (275 acres) and Wescott (50 acres) which are open for passive recreation.

Last Spring, the BBC was joined by biologist Molly Hale and was successful in certifying two vernal pools in town. For people who would like to learn more about unique vernal pool habitats, please contact the BBC and we will provide assistance.

One of our projects this year was writing an Order of Conditions that entailed dealing with a collapsed culvert on the Old Huckleberry Trolley Line adjacent to Cross Pond. The BBC has a series of ongoing meetings and site visits with regards to the complete Long Pond Project including distribution. We have met with several DEP and MEPA officials to discuss the project.

Lastly, in conjunction with the Board of Health, BCC is researching the extent of road salt infiltration into ground water supplies. The BCC is always working to find new ways to protect our town's natural environment while also educating local citizens about "green" living.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

As most of you know, we improved the transfer station with the help of all volunteers just coming down to help. Most of the work on the new building was done by Les Eldridge, Mike Wojcik, Al Flyte & Danny Wojick, plus there were others that helped. We are personally thanking all who gave their free time to make this building a reality. We would like to thank Carlos of C & A construction for hauling in the grindings from the turnpike and Mike Wojcik for making arrangements to get the grindings spread. The transfer station will now be mud free for the citizens of Blandford.

We have made all the food establishments, including the turnpike areas, safe and clean due to many spot Board of Health inspections. All stores, food establishments, fair grounds and any and all places are and will be inspected in the future year by spot inspections at any part of the day, 24 hours a day without notice.

Since the new water system has been installed, the quality of the water has much improved. We also make spot water tests along with the Water Department's monthly testing, and the Water Superintendent, Paul Kvitek, tests the water every day.

We are planning to have hazardous waste containers placed at the transfer station after June 1<sup>st</sup> as soon as possible. This would include containers for TVs, computers, air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, and the like. We will announce the time and dates as soon as we know. We will post it at the transfer station and in the local papers.

We are also going to try to get a sewer line from the school to the turnpike. We will be working with Russell and the turnpike to get this accomplished on our own before it gets mandated by the department of environmental protection. This way it will be much less in cost, as we can do it at our own speed and progress as we have funds. This is needed very badly in the center of town due to failing septic systems that the board has noticed and for the ones that have failed Title V inspections. The average cost of a new septic system from perc to design to installation is from \$18,000 to \$35,000. This is what your neighbors are paying for their new and repaired systems.

We hope to condemn some of the bad buildings in town to make the town safer for residents and rid the area from unwanted critters. We are constantly trying to make the Town of Blandford a better and cleaner place to live.

#### REPORT OF THE HILLTOWN COMMUNITY AMBULANCE ASSOCIATION

#### Overview

Hilltown Community Ambulance Association (HCAA), formed November 2001, is a non-profit corporation governed by an all-volunteer board of directors, with representatives from the towns served. Additionally, the Board includes representatives from Hilltown Community Health Center and the Massachusetts State Police Dispatch Control, Northampton.

HCAA owns two fully equipped and licensed Class I ambulances and serves six towns—more than 8400 residents in a 22-square-mile area in both Hampden and Hampshire counties. Our center of operations is located at 1 Bromley Road, Huntington, which is the geographic center of our service area. Western Massachusetts Electric Company owns and maintains the facility, and generously donates its use.

## REPORT OF THE HILLTOWN COMMUNITY AMBULANCE ASSOCIATION (continued)

#### **Direct Personnel**

Kathleen Rider, a veteran Emergency Medical Technician and Ambulance Service Director, manages day-to-day operations and is responsible to the board of directors. Additionally, HCAA is staffed by two full time EMTs and over 28 volunteer EMTs, all of whom are dedicated professionals certified by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Massachusetts Dept. of Public Health Office of Emergency Management Services (OEMS).

#### Calendar 2003 Activity Overview

During calendar year 2003, HCAA responded to 434 calls. Of these, 42% occurred weekdays 8 am -4 pm, 25% occurred weeknights 6 pm - 6 am, 23% occurred during weekends, and the remaining 10% during weekday early mornings and early evenings. In May 2003, we purchased a model year 2000 ambulance with 20K miles, replacing a 1993 with over 200K miles.

#### 2004-05 Improvement/Ongoing Projects

Currently HCAA is licensed to provide basic level ambulance service and, when needed, arranges intercepts by area advanced-level providers. During FY 2005, increasing value to its service area, HCAA will upgrade its capabilities from Basic to Intermediate Level Advanced Life Support (ALS). This need was illustrated when 434 calls were analyzed to show 60% required at least some ALS treatment.

Thanks to grants from McKesson Corporation, and the Gage Olmstead and Lockridge-Watkins funds of the Community Foundation of Western Massachusetts, nine EMTs will train to function at the intermediate level. The extensive program includes 100 classroom hours, minimum 40 hours of inhospital training, and minimum 80 hours on-ambulance training. EMTs then take an OEMS-administered test to become certified. In addition to the actual EMT training, HCAA will purchase equipment and obtain licensure to provide ALS—intermediate level service. The entire project began Feb.2004 and will be completed May 2005.

This year, HCAA will again offer an emergency response subscription service. In May, invitations to participate will be mailed to all households in the communities served by HCAA. Participation is voluntary, covers emergency transports and physician-ordered non-emergency transports, and payment of subscription fees is considered payment-in-full for any service provided by HCAA which is not covered by the client's insurance.

Sensitive to the network of support so heavily relied upon by residents, HCAA and other local emergency agents acknowledge the increased benefit to patient care that can be had with mutual corroboration and continue to encourage it.

#### Personnel Resources

We are fortunate to have several resources from which to draw. Most important are first responders, who have provided invaluable assistance to our EMTs at accident scenes and other medical emergencies. Many first responders are members of town fire departments. Others include local and state police, and ski patrol personnel. In case of multiple emergencies, HCAA has mutual aid

agreements with ambulance services in surrounding communities. Finally, paramedic intercept agreements have been established with the Westfield Fire Department, County Ambulance, and American Medical Response to provide assistance with the most serious cases. Alliance with these resources has strengthened the overall effort to serve our communities.

#### Funding (current/future)

Concerning HCAA funding, reimbursements from Medicare, Medicaid, insurance companies and private payments cover the majority of costs. Additionally, towns served by HCAA appropriate funds to help meet operating costs. Grants and generous donations from individuals, families and businesses cover the balance.

Sensitive to host towns' austere financial circumstances, HCAA requests communities <u>level fund</u> ambulance service, appropriating the same dollars in FY 2005 as in FYs 2004 and 2003. Acknowledging HCAA's growth, we are pleased to advise that each year community funding becomes less a percentage of our total funding.

We are grateful for the overwhelming support the communities, particularly the town fire departments, have given us. It has enabled HCAA to fulfill its mission to provide quality emergency medical service to the residents of the Hilltowns. Thank you.

If you are an EMT or would like to become one, please call us, 413-667-3277. We sponsor local certification and continuing education programs for qualified persons willing to serve with HCCA.

#### REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Blandford Historical Commission has had a very busy second year. Though we did not receive a DEM grant last year, due to it not being funded by the state, we were very pleased to learn that we were one of only two communities that were invited to be part of a pilot program that the state was offering. We are receiving "free" help from state agencies to begin the work of identifying the historic resources in Blandford and documenting them on Massachusetts Historical Commission Inventory Forms.

The Commission is also very pleased to report that we have recently received a \$3,500.00 grant from the Highland Communities Initiative, a program of The Trustees of Reservations. This grant will be used to continue the inventory by professional arborists of the plants, shrubs, and trees in Watson Park. This is the first step in what we hope will result in restoring the Park to its former grandeur.

We will continue to seek other grants and funding sources for this project, and more, and hope to some day be able to acquire properties of historical value within Town. We look forward to continuing to work with the Planning Board and Conservation Commission as we have on multiple issues in Town. It has been a pleasure working with these boards; their dedication and hard work is appreciated. We

would also like to thank the Historical Society. Their tireless efforts have made our job so much easier. We are very fortunate to have them in Town and look forward to having our work compliment each other. #### REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Trustees have had to secure the library building by eliminating use of the book drop slot located on the left side of the entry way. Having the drop slot open posed potential risk to the library, according to the town's insurer, so it was closed. The trustees have been awarded a loss control grant by Massachusetts Interlocal Insurance Association to purchase a proper drop box that will be installed at the same side of the entry that the original book drop slot was located. The grant is for \$1,600.

The trustees have met twice with the charter members of the Friends of the Porter Memorial Library. The group plans an organizational kick-off for late spring or early summer this year.

The library continues to be a gathering place and now hosts a knitting group as well as a reading club.

The trustees are responsible for the management of the Utley Fund, which this year earned \$317.36 from June 30 1002 to June 30, 2003. This is a restricted fund and only the interest may be used for library materials and programs. Interest on the Utley Fund Interest earned \$70.74.

The Tiffany/Porter/Haight fund earned \$368.56 from June 30, 2002 to June 30, 2003; and the Schwab investment account earned \$284.08 from June 30, 2002 to June 30, 2003. The interest on the checking account (Schwab) earned \$62.19: \$781.01 was expended and new income was \$274.14 from donations and book sales.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board continues to work with the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission in completing the Community Development Plan. Though behind schedule, we hope this plan will provide a better understanding of what the future of Blandford can hold for its residents and how this vision can be implemented.

The Board was disappointed at the failure of the Scenic Roads ByLaw to pass Town Meeting, but looks forward to presenting other innovative bylaws that will help protect the rural quality of our town. Under discussion is a conservation subdivision bylaw that will offer developers an option that will protect open space while still allowing housing development.

In addition to approving the division of several parcels of land, numerous forms for the construction of new homes were signed. This new building has prompted some residents to question the effectiveness of our current zoning bylaws in protecting Blandford's quality of life. The Board is applying for a grant to hire a consultant to help in the process of revising the Bylaws. Input from residents will be required in order to make this as representative of the wishes of the majority as possible.

The Board has changed its meeting night to the first Thursday of the month so that the large table in the office might be used in reviewing plans more efficiently. We encourage residents to attend our meetings to express concerns or offer ideas.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

This was another busy year for the Board of Selectmen. We thank Andy Iglesias for his service to the town as a member of the Board for the past three years. We will look for his continued involvement in other areas of Blandford.

There have been many changes in personnel in the town, and we thank all those who have served over the years, as well as the people who have stepped forward into elected and appointed positions. We would like to acknowledge the efforts of those individuals who worked directly with the Selectmen on a regular basis including Police Chief Doug Pisano, Highway Superintendent Mitch Forish along with Don Wojick on the Highway Department, Town Accountant Linda Broughton, and Building Inspector Rick Moraweic. The town welcomed Charlie Harner as the new Police Chief, Keith Ackley as the new Highway Superintendent along with returning Highway Department employee Tate Walker, Staci Iglesias who is serving as Acting Town Accountant, and new Building Inspector Eric Munson. Their assistance is most helpful in addressing many of the issues being faced by the Town of Blandford.

To begin with a review of the year's activities, we are pleased to say that there has been some work done at Watson Park. The grounds received some much-needed attention by a tree company to the damaged trees through pruning and removal of dangerous branches. In addition, the Historical Commission has hired professional arborists who have begun to inventory the plants, shrubs, and trees at the park, as well as identifying remnants of historical plant matter from the 1930s when the park was created. As the Trustees of Watson Park, we hope to begin to return the park to something closer to its original design and condition. This, of course, will take several years, but it is good to be started on this important task. With two historic barns on that property, this is a significant area at the center of town. The Blandford Historical Society has financed some restoration of the back barn to stabilize its condition in hopes for the future of housing a museum there for their collection of historic Blandford farming equipment. The town is fortunate to have these two historical groups recognizing and caring for these landmarks. Finally, a core of parents is spearheading improvements and completion of the soccer fields at the park.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN, (continued)

Another area that received attention is the creation of a personnel policy with specific procedures for town workers. This benefits the town as well as the employees by providing clarity in expectations and responsibilities that should serve everyone better. As always, communication, careful listening, and cooperation in working together to solve problems is needed in our dealings with one another in town government and with town residents.

One way we continue to communicate between town departments is to hold quarterly All-Boards meetings. These have been well attended by appointed and elected department chairs, and the opportunity for such gatherings has afforded us all the chance to share ideas and information. We will continue this valuable format.

Three examples of how the group effort has paid off deal with the school, use of local land, and the townspeople's vision for Blandford in the future. First, progress has been made on the strong possibility that the Blandford Elementary School will again be open for our children to attend. This will also mark the return of one of our local gathering places where we can see our fellow residents on a more regular basis. Secondly, the Open Space Plan Committee, comprised of members of several town boards, is putting the finishing touches on the town's update of the Open Space Plan. Not only will this assure the protection of key characteristics of our rural landscape, but it will also put the town in a better position to be considered for grant money. Lastly, the Community Development Planning Committee (again made up of a variety of residents) has kept up its work in gathering input from town residents about what we want for Blandford's future.

An additional critical issue is the serious consideration of hiring a part-time town administrator as a central contact in town – for residents as well as for town boards. The Selectmen have received positive feedback for some time about the importance of this role for grant writing, coordination of efforts, and knowledge of state government, all of which appointed and elected officials do not have adequate time to handle. The aim also is to establish some consistency from year to year. As a result, residents will see an article to be voted on at our Annual Town Meeting to establish this essential position. Although hard to find extra money in the budget for this job, in the end, the investment into this position should pay off almost immediately. We must address this need now as we are continually forced to consider state policies and procedures. The Town of Blandford can no longer afford not to take action on this matter.

One of the projects that has called for much coordination on several fronts has been the ongoing water project. As the work moves forward to completion, we hope to be able to have the Highway Department focus on finally having the chance to repair and improve many of the town roads. Overall, it has been a very muddy and messy year for road conditions, and hopefully the spring will be drier and we can start getting the roads back in shape once the weather improves. We have STRAP grant monies for road repair, and Second Division Road will be first on the list. Along with its condition, we are investigating the effects of traffic and speed on the repeated deterioration of that road. Studies and samples have been completed to help determine an appropriate speed.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN, (continued)

As is so often the case, governmental regulations at the state and federal level continue to add a tremendous burden to the town both financially and in terms of time, as we must constantly meet new regulations. One such situation that will have a costly impact on Blandford's budget for the next few years is bringing our town buildings up to current standards to meet the ADA accessibility requirements. While this is an important matter, there are rarely provisions to assist small towns such as ours in meeting these new laws. We, no doubt, will be looking for creative and cost-effective ways to complete these mandates.

On a positive note, although it has been a slow process with small steps taken along the way, the two Selectmen have acquired a good deal of free hardware equipment and donations so that the Town Offices are finally coming into the current century in terms of computer capabilities! Not only will this assist residents in staying up to date on issues facing the town, it will also allow town boards to communicate with each other as well as with the state in conducting town business. This should make all departments much more efficient, thus saving money in the long run.

Finally, speaking of finances, we have been actively seeking ways to increase revenues coming into the town. Several procedures in this effort that are already underway include collecting back taxes owed to the town, considering the financial benefits of wind turbines, and investigating ways to receive our fair share of PILOT monies and appropriate compensation from organizations that impact Blandford such as Springfield Water and Sewer Commission, The Springfield Ski Club, the Massachusetts Turnpike, the

Massachusetts management and DEM for state forests and other state land located in town, and the other towns that own watershed land in Blandford. So much of the financial business can have a cumulative effect that it can sometimes be overwhelming and hard to close out past matters and focus on the present. Many town officers have put in long hours to clarify the town's financial picture in an effort to use our time more efficiently, to stop having to redo things, and to anticipate situations rather than being unprepared for the unexpected. We have gotten many of our state officials involved to assist us in these areas, and we will continue to consult the townspeople for their input and feedback on these matters.

Please do come and talk to us with your ideas, questions, and comments. We represent the townspeople and want to serve you as well as we can. Our job is more effective when we know your responses to the issues. Blandford is well served by many dedicated officials, most of whom are grossly underpaid for the time they put in working for the town. We thank you for your support of everyone who works on your behalf. In closing, remember: Volunteer! Ask how you can help! Get involved! It's our town, and Blandford needs the efforts of more of us working together.

#### REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSIONERS

The Board of Water Commissioners is pleased to announce that the Phase III portion of the Grant/Loan from USDA has been finalized. We would like to thank all of the Town Boards, especially the Board of Selectmen, Chet Broughton and Bill Devin, and the Town Treasurer, Anne Holliday, for all of their hard work and fortitude to make sure that the new Water Filtration System becomes a reality in the very near future.

Phase I has been completed with only a few water main breaks (all involving old pipes) and only two major water main freezes during this extremely cold and harsh winter. Phase II is entering the repair and construction portion of the access road and dam on Long Pond, which will commence as soon as the weather permits and the roads can be made accessible. This has been an extremely hard spring so far, with everyone experiencing high water levels and severe mud problems. The new water meters are in the process of being installed and we hope this is completed by mid-spring. The Water Commissioners would like to thank all of the water users for their patience and assistance in working with the meter company to get the new meters installed as quickly and as expediently as possible.

The Phase III part of the Rural Development - USDA - Grant/Loan for the engineering process of the Water Filtration Plant will begin in the spring with the anticipated construction of the Filtration plant scheduled for late 2004 or early 2005. The Water Filtration Plant, once constructed, will be a great asset to the Town of Blandford.

The downside to having such an excellent system in place is that the Water Commissioners had to raise the water rates. This action is only temporary until the new water meters are in operation and the water usage can be fully assessed and the rates adjusted to compensate for higher water users. The Water Department is in a high maintenance stage right now so that we can continue to keep major water main problems and leaks at a minimum, thus ensuring the quality and quantity of water that we are finally experiencing.

A special thanks to Ed Forish, Bruce Cooley, Sean Cloutier, Mitch Forish, and John Kelly for working to complete the Kaolin Road Project given to the Town of Blandford through a grant from the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority - and for staying within the budget. This project will be completed in early spring thanks to an extension from the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority. Great job guys!!!

Congratulations to Frank Verderber on his election to the Board of Water Commissioners and much appreciation to Les Eldridge for staying with the Commissioners during these trying times. Both men have literally been in the trenches during heavy rain, ice and snowstorms and severe cold to ensure that the water keeps flowing to all of the water customers in Blandford. And our extreme gratitude to the two women who have worked so hard in making all of this possible - Lee Ann Thompson and Elaine Kelly. Thanks just doesn't seem enough for all that you have done.

And finally, the Water Commissioners would like to express its sincere thanks to all of the Town Boards, the Town workers, and especially to the good people of Blandford for having the foresight to make our water resources one of the best in the State.

General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 53F½ for the purpose of establishing a separate account classified as an enterprise fund for the operation of the Water Department.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Planning Board and Subdivision Bylaws by adding the attached 'Scenic Roads Designation' language (below) as a new Section ??: Scenic Roads Bylaw.

#### 1.0 Scenic Roads

Under authority of M.G.L. Ch. 40, Sec. 15C-Scenic Roads, this bylaw establishes the procedure which must be followed if substantial trimming, cutting down, or removal of trees or tearing down or deconstruction of stone walls, or portions thereof, is proposed in conjunction with any repair, maintenance, reconstruction, or paving work on roads so designated. Work on roads involving the substantial trimming, cutting down, or removal of trees requires the approval of both the Planning Board and the Tree Warden.

#### 1.661 Purpose

The purpose of this Scenic Roads Bylaw is to preserve the qualities and character of certain public ways by insuring that:

- 1.11 ways will be recommended for designation as scenic roads in accordance with stated criteria;
- 1.12 scenic roads will not be altered except after compliance with stated procedures;
- 1.13 scenic roads will not be altered by the decision of any person, organization, or agency other than the Blandford Planning Board; and
- 1.14 public shade trees will not be cut, removed, or damaged except after compliance with M.G.L. Chapter 87, and this bylaw.

#### 1.662 Definitions

In the absence of contrary meaning established through legislative or judicial action pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 40, Section 15C or M.G.L. Chapter 87, the following terms contained in that statute shall be defined as follows:

- 1.663 "Cutting or removal of trees" the cutting or removal of trees shall mean the removal of one or more trees, trimming of major branches or cutting of roots.
- "Repair, maintenance, reconstruction, or paving work" shall mean any work done within the right-ofway by any person or agency, public or private. Within this definition is any work on any portion of the right-of-way, which was not physically commenced at the time the road was designated as a scenic road. Construction of new driveways or alteration of existing ones is also included insofar as it takes place within the right-of-way unless an approved driveway permit has been obtained.
- 1.665 "Road" shall mean a right-of-way used or maintained as a public way including necessary appurtances within the right-of-way such as bridges, drainage systems, retaining walls, traffic control devices, and sidewalks, but not intersecting streets or driveways. When the boundary of the right-of-way is an issue so that a dispute arises as to whether or not certain trees or stone walls or portions thereof are within or without the way, the trees or stone walls shall be presumed to be within the way until contrary is shown.
- 1.666 "Tearing down or destruction of stone walls" shall mean the destruction of more than fifteen linear feet of stone wall involving more than one cubic foot of wall material per linear foot above existing grade but shall not be construed to include temporary removal and replacement at the same location with the same materials.
- 1.667 "Trees" shall include a tree whose trunk has a diameter of four inches or more as measured four feet above the ground.

#### 1.668 Designation of Scenic Roads

#### 1.669 Procedures

Scenic Roads shall be designated by majority vote of Town Meeting. Public ways may be recommended by the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, or Historical Commission for designation as a scenic road upon a finding that the way meets one of

the following criteria and has been determined by the Blandford Planning Board to be reasonably safe in its present condition for vehicular travel.

#### 1.670 Criteria

In determining which way or portions of ways should be designated as scenic roads, the following criteria shall be considered:

- 1.671 Ways bordered by trees of exceptional size or quality, or unusual or distinctive variety;
- 1.672 Ways bordered by stone walls;
- 1.673 Ways bordered by any natural or man-made features of aesthetic value to the community;
- 1.674 Ways providing scenic views of water, rolling fields, woodlands, or orchards;
- 1.675 Ways bordered by historic or archeological structures or site of significance to the community;
- 1.676 Ways for which alteration is being planned or is likely to be planned;
- 1.677 Ways for which any alteration would significantly degrade the aesthetic value of the natural or man-made features bordering them;
- 1.678 Ways with special road features worthy of preservation, such as road surface material, layout, carriage width, and use restrictions.

#### 1.679 Notification of Designation as Scenic Roads

The Planning Board shall, within thirty (30) days of the designation of a scenic road:

- 1.680 Notify all municipal departments
- 1.681 Notify the State department of Public Works
- 1.682 Publish in a newspaper of local circulation an informal article or notice describing the designation
- 1.683 Indicate such designation on all maps currently in use by municipal departments
- 1.684 Notify all utility companies which are likely to be working on the border of such road

#### 1.685 Planning Board Regulations

The Blandford Planning Board may adopt more detailed regulations regarding implementation of scenic roads designations.

#### 1.686 Effect of Scenic Road Designation

No road repair, maintenance, reconstruction, or paving pertaining to a designated Scenic Road shall involve or include the cutting or removal of trees, or the tearing down or destruction of stone walls, or portions thereof, or substantial alteration to the road surface or shoulder, except in accordance with the following:

- 1.661 Any person, organization, state or municipal agency seeking the written consent of the Planning Board, regarding the cutting or removal of trees or the tearing down or destruction of stone walls, or portions thereof, or significant alteration to the road surface or shoulder on a scenic road shall file a request with the Planning Board, together with the following:
- 1.662 The text of a legal notice identifying the location of the proposed action in terms enabling readers to locate it with reasonable specificity on the ground without need for additional plans or references, and describing in reasonable detail the proposed changes to trees and stone walls;
- 1.663 A statement of the purpose, or purposes, for the changes proposed;
- 1.664 A list of the owners of property on the same road abutting the proposed action;
- 1.665 Except in the case of town agencies, a deposit sufficient to cover the cost of advertising and notification; and
- 1.666 Any further explanatory material useful to adequately inform the Planning Board

#### 1.667 Notice

The Planning Board shall, as required by statute, give notice of its public hearing by advertising twice in a newspaper of general circulation in the area. This notice shall contain a statement as to the time, date, place, and purpose of the hearing with a reasonable description of the action proposed by the applicant. Copies of this notice shall also be sent to the Board of Selectmen, the Conservation Commission, the Historical Commission, the Highway Department, the Tree Warden, and the owners of property on the same road abutting the proposed action.

#### 1.668 Timing of Notice

The first publication of the notice shall be as soon as feasible after the Planning Board receives the request from the applicant, and shall in all cases be at least fourteen (14) days before the hearing. The last publication shall occur, as required by statute, at least seven (7) days prior to the hearing.

#### 1.669 Timing of Hearing

The Planning Board shall hold a public hearing within thirty (30) days of the planning board meeting at which a properly filed request is received. The date and time of the public hearing shall be set outside of normal weekday work hours (8:00 AM - 5:00 PM, Monday - Friday) so as to encourage maximum citizen participation.

#### 1.670 Timing of Decision

The Planning Board shall make a decision on the request within twenty-one (21) days of the public hearing.

#### 1.671 Basis of Decision

The Planning Board's decision of any application for proposed action affecting designated scenic roads shall be based on consideration of the following:

Preservation of natural resources

Other reasonable planning considerations

Public safety
Compensatory actions proposed, such as replacement of trees or stone walls

#### 1.7 Enforcement and Penalties

Failure to file with the Planning Board for permission to cut or remove trees or for destruction of any portion of a stonewall within the layout of any scenic road will require an immediate filing as detailed above and the applicant shall be required to restore the features if required by the Planning Board. This restoration shall consist of replacing the stonewall as necessary and replacing the trees cut on a square-inch per square-inch basis (combined area of the replacement trees measured one foot above ground level to equal total area of the original tree trunk as measured at the stump) at locations specified by the Planning Board.

Failure to comply with a duly issued decision of the Planning Board shall be subject to restoration as detailed above and other remedial measures that the Planning Board deems necessary, including, but not limited to the enforcement of the restoration measures as stated above. Any decision not carried out within two years of issue shall be void and shall require a new filing.

The Planning Board, where appropriate, shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this by-law.

Any violation of this By-law, M.G.L. Chapter 40. Section 1 5C, or a Planning Board decision issued under this By-law or M.G.L. Chapter 40, Section 1 5C, shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed three hundred dollars per violation. Each day or portion thereof during which a violation continues shall

constitute a separate offense. For purposes of the non-criminal disposition, any member duly authorized by a majority of the members of the Planning Board, the Building Inspector, and Police Officers shall all be enforcing persons.

#### 1.8 Severability

The invalidity of any section or provision of this bylaw shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

Following the public hearing. the school committee shall take additional written comment for a thirty-day period and no vote shall be taken unless the member towns are issued fourteen days notice of the date, time and location of the school committee's meeting, at which it intends to formally vote.

Seventeenth C, Real estate, to the taxable valuation of two thousand dollars or the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars, whichever would result in an abatement of the greater amount of actual taxes due, of a surviving spouse or of any minor whose parent is deceased, occupied by such spouse, or minor as her or his domicile, or a person or persons over the age of seventy who has owned and occupied it as a domicile for not less than ten years; provided, that the whole estate, real and personal, of such spouse, person or minor does not exceed in value the sum of forty thousand dollars, exclusive of property otherwise exempt under clauses Twelfth, Twentieth and Twenty-first, exclusive of the value of the mortgage interest held by persons other than the person or persons to be exempted in such

mortgaged real estate as may be included in such whole estate and exclusive of the first sixty thousand dollars in value of real estate occupied by such person as his domicile. No real estate shall be so exempt which the assessors shall adjudge has been conveyed to such spouse, person or minor to evade taxation. A spouse, person or minor aggrieved by any such judgment may appeal to the county commissioners or to the appellate tax board within the time and in such manner allowed by section sixty-four or sixty-five, as the case may be. Any exemption under this clause, to the taxable valuation of two thousand dollars or the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars, whichever would result in an abatement of the greater amount of actual taxes due may be apportioned among the persons whose title to the real estate was acquired under the provisions of section three of chapter one hundred and ninety and who qualify for an exemption under this clause. This clause shall take effect upon its acceptance by any city or town. In those cities and towns which accept the provisions of this clause, the provisions of clause Seventeenth shall not be applicable; provided, however, that the state treasurer shall annually reimburse the city or town an amount equal to the reimbursement granted to such city or town under said clause Seventeenth for the most recent fiscal year in which it received such reimbursement.

An act providing for recall elections in the Town of Blandford. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:

SECTION 1: Any holder of an elective office may be recalled therefrom by the registered voters of the town as herein provided,

SECTION 2: One hundred or more qualified voters may make and file with the Town Clerk an affidavit containing the name of the officer sought to be recalled and a statement of the grounds for recall. The Town Clerk shall thereupon deliver to the ten persons first named on such affidavit a sufficient number of petition blanks demanding such recall, copies of which printed forms he shall keep available. Said petition blanks may be completed by printing or typewriter and they shall contain the names of the ten persons to whom they are issued, the name of the person sought to be recalled, the office from which recall is sought, and the grounds for recall as stated in the affidavit. They shall demand the election of a successor to the office and they shall be dated, signed and sealed by the Town Clerk. Said recall petition shall be returned to the office of the Town Clerk not later than three o'clock in the afternoon on or before the first work day following twenty days after the date they are issued, signed by at least twenty-five percent of the total number of qualified persons registered to vote in the town as of the date such affidavit was filed with the Town Clerk. To every signature shall be added the place of residence of the signer, giving the street and number, if any. One of the ten persons to whom the recall petition forms is issued shall make an affidavit on each page that statements therein contained are true, and that each signature appended to the petition is the genuine signature of the person whose name it purports to be.

The Town Clerk shall, within seventy-two hours following the day of such filing with the office of the Town Clerk, submit the recall petition forms to the Board of Registrars of voters which shall, within five work days after the day of receipt, certify in writing thereon the number of signatures which are those of qualified persons registered to vote in the Town as of the date such affidavit was filed with the Town Clerk. The Board of Registrars of voters, upon the completion of their certification, shall return the recall petition forms to the Town Clerk.

SECTION 3: If said recall petition forms shall be certified by the Board of Registrars of voters to contain at least twenty-five percent of the qualified persons registered to vote and if the petition shall be found and certified by the Town Clerk to be sufficient, the Town Clerk shall give notice without delay, in writing, to the elected officer whose recall is sought by sending to said officer a copy of the affidavit and the recall petition form together with notice of the number of qualified voters certified by the Board of Registrars of voters who signed the recall petition forms and the total number of qualified voters in the town as of the most recent town election.

If the officer to whom notice is directed by the Town Clerk does not resign the office within five days following receipt of the aforesaid notice from the Town Clerk, the Town Clerk shall give notice in writing to the Board of Selectmen not later than one work day following the expiration of the foregoing five days. The Board of Selectmen shall order a special election to be held not less than sixty-four nor more than ninety days after the receipt of notice from the Town Clerk as aforesaid, If, however, any other town election is to be held within one hundred days of receipt by the Board of Selectmen of notice from the Town Clerk, the recall election shall be postponed and shall be held at such time and in conjunction with such other election. If a vacancy occurs in the office for any reason after a recall election has been ordered by the Board of Selectmen, the recall election shall nevertheless proceed as provided for herein.

SECTION 4: Any officer sought to be removed may be a candidate to succeed himself, and unless he requests otherwise in writing, the Town Clerk shall place his name on the ballot without nomination. The number of signatures of qualified voters required to place the name of a candidate on the official ballot for use at a recall election shall not be less than twenty-five. The publication of the warrant for the recall election and the conduct of the recall election shall be in accordance with the General Laws relative to elections, unless otherwise provided in this act.

SECTION 5: The incumbent shall continue to perform the duties of this office until the recall election. If then recalled and reelected pursuant to Section 6, he shall continue in office for the remainder of his unexpired term subject to recall as before, except as provided in this section. If recalled and not reelected in the recall election held pursuant to Section 6, he shall be deemed removed upon the qualification of his successor, who shall hold office during the unexpired term. If the successor fails to qualify within five days after receiving notification of his election, the office shall be deemed vacant.

Immediately at the right of each proposition there shall be a square in which the voter, by making a cross mark (x) may vote for either of such propositions. Under the propositions shall appear the word "Candidates" and the directions for the voters required by law, and beneath the word "Candidates" shall be the names of candidates nominated as hereinabove provided.

If a majority of the votes cast is against the recall, the votes for the candidates need not be counted. If a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the recall, the officer shall be deemed to be recalled and the ballots for candidates shall then be counted. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. If the officer is recalled, he shall be deemed removed upon certification of the election results by the Town Clerk. The candidate receiving the highest vote and therefore elected, shall serve for the balance of the unexpired term of the officer removed.

SECTION 7: No recall petition shall be filed against an officer within six months after he takes office nor, in the case of an officer elected in a recall election, until six months after that election. No recall shall be filed against an officer subjected to a recall election, and not recalled thereby, until at least six months after the election at which his recall was submitted to the voters.

SECTION 8: No person who has been recalled from an office, or who has resigned from office while recall proceedings were pending against him, shall be appointed to any town office within one year after such recall or such resignation.

SECTION 9: This act shall take effect upon its passage.
