The Blandford Fair the early years

The Blandford Fair had its beginnings dating from 1859 when a group of local farmers got together weekly to discuss agricultural issues, seemingly, according to research done by Lynn Anderson, to promote better farming. This was the Farmers' Club.

The topsoil was not very deep – nor is it today – and the location did not offer many level acres of land. Farming was not an easy occupation in Blandford so the information shared not only within the group but from visiting speakers was surely beneficial.

By 1866 the group had decided to seek a state charter and organized under the name the Union Agricultural and Horticultural Society to promote and "encourage Agriculture Horticulture Floriculture Manufactures the Mechanical and Fine Arts."

Stock in the new organization was sold for \$5 a share, entitling a vote; as an aside, women were allowed live membership for \$1 but could not vote until 1922.

Watson Boise sold the land, about ten acres, to the society for \$400 in 1867. The area is pretty much the same today, but was extended sometime later to include the area beyond the judges' stand.

The first fair was held October 9 and 10, 1867. There must have been a great flurry of activity to prepare

the grounds for the event. Cattle and horses were shown and the town hall was used for the display of vegetables, fruits and household goods.

The *Springfield Republican* reported, "There were great pumpkins and squashes, plates of potatoes,



years old pickle grown in the vial which contained it, seed corn... cranberries... bedquilts, rag carpets, bread, butter, cake and a single cheese

and apples, a six

made from a single cow..."and more.

The next year the group set up a tent to serve as a hall for displays. Apparently feeling very sure of their

success, the society went on to construct a proper hall for the following year. It was a two-story building; the second floor was the hall, and the first floor was a dining hall – large enough for 200 people.

The state required that the hall be used throughout the year, mandating at least three "institutes" held and for a long time, the hall was the only place in town that could accommodate large crowds. The hall was used for dances, town meetings, roller skating, the Fox Club dinners and other events.

Over the next several years, the track was spruced up and more buildings added and in 1891 more land was purchased to accommodate a half-mile race track.

The fair was held in the fall and the dates var-

ied throughout September and October. It was not until 1927 that the fair came to be held on Labor Day, by 1945 the fair included Sunday of Labor Day weekend with the hall for exhibits and the outbuildings for the animals. The number of days the fair was held bounced about quite a bit, from two days to three days, and then back to two days, and now it is four days.

Trevor Judd, in his Yarns of a Yankee Youth, Stories of My Childhood, tells of turning the cranks to operate organ for the merrygo-round music for a free ride. He recalled the most popular concession was Ben

Smithies' Oyster Tent, where the "inlanders could eat their fill of fine stew with lots of butter and plenty of crackers for \$.25."

He had fond memories of the high-rise bike rider who disassembled the bike as he rode, finishing with what must have been a most unusual unicycle – the large front wheel! Judd said, "There are, today, hundreds of trick riders who spin around on a little wheel with or without a seat attached, but he was the only trick artist I have ever seen who started on a complete bicycle and dismantled it while riding."

Judd was born in Chester but spent most of his life in North Blandford.

This year is the fair's 145th year. It will be a time for reuniting friends and families as those who grew up and grew away return to celebrate a favorite Labor Day event.
