Boiled Terrapin

Blandford Winters and their traditions

Winters were not easy times in Blandford. There was a lot of snow and often, ice. Winter started early and ended late. The coldest part of Blandford was out Chester Road, beyond Martin's...*the Maples*. Looking through files at the Historical Society only brought one mention of Halloween; Harold Lloyd used to build a bonfire at a brook, and "tell ghost stories to the neighborhood children" according to his grandson Joseph Roberts

A list of Winter traditions must include the Blandford Fox Club dinners. Held the first Saturday in November from 1899 to 1983, the 84th and final Fox Club dinner was held in 1983 because women would not cook nor serve; and the event collapsed. The dinner's demise made national news, with a clipping sent from California to prove it.

Chestnuts were gathered after the first frost up on Birch Hill. When left to sit, they became sweeter.

A Blandford winter tale was passed along by Pros(per) Montovani. His family owned a farm at the end of George Millard Road and later they lived at the top of Main Street in the mustard yellow house.

At an October 1986 Historical Society program, he told of owning a giant toboggan, a Double Ripper – as long as two eight-foot tables – which carried 15 to 18 riders. "First, Warren Bedurtha would drive his big Pierce Arrow truck down the hill (Main Street). Then about ten minutes later, we'd start at The White Church. This is a fact," he said, "we would go all the way to the package store (Base Camp) without stopping. When we went by Fowler Farm down here, we were traveling. He'd (Bedurtha) be waiting with the truck. We would hitch on the Ripper and he would haul us back. We were good for about two slides a night."

Trevor Judd wrote about early Christmases in *Yarns of a Yankee Youth, story of my childhood*. Christmas circa 1890s was very different.

"In those days, nobody in Blandford had a private Christmas Tree, not for any lack of trees as there

were all around us beautiful spruces, pines and the feathery hemlocks, but everybody pitched in to assist in the concerted selection, cutting, hauling, erection and decorating of two large community trees that reached from floor to

ceiling; sometimes in the Church, but frequently in the large single space without posts over the cheese factory.

Groups of people spent days stringing popcorn lines, making and hanging cornucopias of many colors filled with Christmas candy, (and everybody got one) red seed pods from wild roses, still on the branches, mingled with small red and green candles that were clipped on all over the massive trees. After the Christmas program, when the distribution of gifts started, the candles were lighted – an invitation to calamity, but nothing interfered with these community Christmas celebrations."

Judd recounted the story of gift distribution. He allowed as how there was one youngster - Frank - related to "the prolific Higgins tribe in and around North Blandford, so that kid had more relatives than a toad has warts." His parents (we assume he lived with them) lived in Albany, according to Judd, and most likely to his consternation as well.

Frank sat in a front seat and would yell "Here" when his name was called, apparently one too many times for Judd. Each tree had what Judd called an "official picker-off-er" who called the name out for each gift under the tree. Frank's name was called frequently, almost every other gift had his name on it. Judd envied

"that kid" who "redeemed himself by finally entering the ministry" and devoting himself to good works, and eventually retiring to North Blandford.

Christmas in the center Chapel was a large gathering, too. All children would put on a program, and every child was invited to participate and received an orange and a candy.

Cutting ice to sell to 'summer people' began in the early 1900s by Charles Hayden. Doris Hay-

den's husband, Ralph, continued the business. After Christmas, the pond, near Birch Meadow Farm and Crooks Road, was a skater's delight. The pond was eventually scuttled by Springfield Water as being 'dirty.'

Today the Historical Society hosts an annual Christmas Tree lighting with caroling followed by hot chocolate and assorted Christmas cookies. The First Congregational Church Choir carols at homes as well.

Storms are no strangers to Blandford and have put the town in the headlines on more than one occasion. There were significant storms, with significant damage in November 1921, an ice storm; in December 1942 Blandford was isolated by an ice storm and then hit again in January 1943 with another ice storm. In 1958 snow paralyzed Hilltowns, and again in January 2002. More recent storms include the most memorable 2008 ice storm and last year's Halloween snow event.

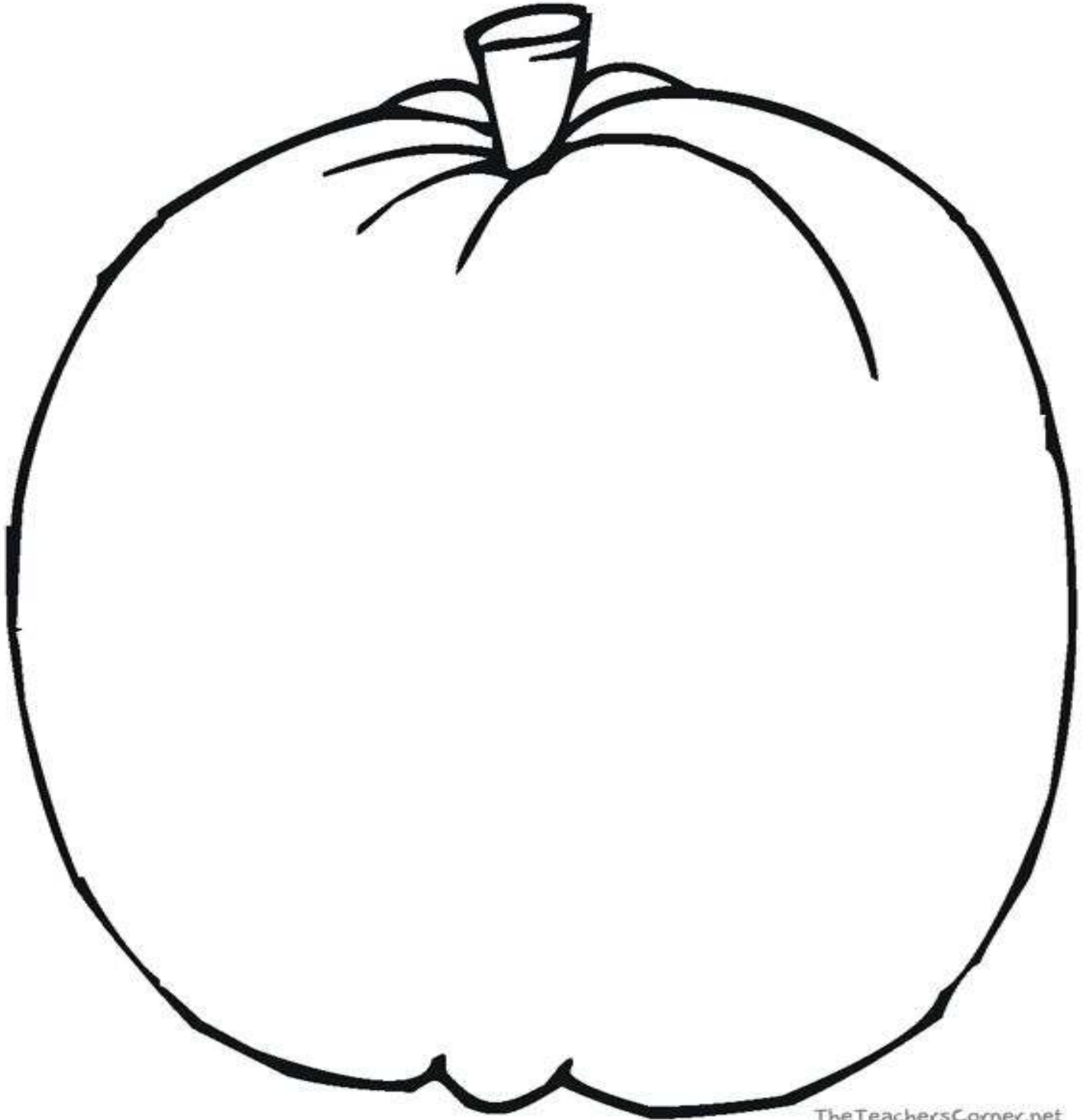
