

TOWN OF BLANDFORD Board of Selectmen, Minutes March 24, 2015

Posted Agenda Items:

- 1. Wired West Presentation
 - a. Mr. Dolby presented a Power Point Presentation on the subject. See attached.
- 2. Questions & Answers:
 - a. If the electricity goes out will Broadband still work?
 - i. Yes, there will be a back-up of 24 usage hours.
 - **b.** Customer service offered?
 - i. Wired West will know before you do that your service is out and we will send someone out to fix it.
 - c. T.V. Packages offered?
 - i. Wired West will be doing a survey to determine which channels to offer. Currently negotiating with New England Sports to stream games. Many people may end up not choosing a T.V. package and stream shows over the internet instead.
 - ii. T.V. pricing?
 - 1. There will not be any introductory offers. Not sure on price yet.
 - **d.** Is there a data cap?
 - i. No.
 - e. Tax Increase?
 - i. Worst case scenarios: First two years no increase, in 2018 increase of \$106.00 per/family per/year, in 2019 increase of \$113.00 per/family per/year, in 2020 increase of \$118.26 per/family per/year, in 2021 increase of \$175.14 per/family per/year. With 40% of town signed up, the co-op will most likely be self-sustaining by year 6 and will start to generate revenue back into the town's general fund. Each town will have a choice as to how long they want to borrow for.
 - **f.** Who owns the infrastructure?
 - i. The town does. The Municipal Light Board rep will sit on the board.
 - **g.** What if there is damage to the lines?
 - i. Wired West carries insurance for this reason. Operate as a business and the State mandates they maintain a capital reserve balance to make

repairs. They will also use this account to update electronics every 7 years and keep technology up-to-date.

- **h.** Why not just use wireless?
 - i. Wireless is good for mobility. But radio signals get weaker as go farther from source. Has the capacity of 20-30 mbps with certain amount of customers and can't go much beyond that. Fiber can't deteriorate. What will improve are the electronics which we will be updating on a regular basis.
- i. Why should we sign up now?
 - i. Need to get 40% signed up as a town to move forward. If you sign up later it will cost more.
- j. Phone wiring:

i. Same wiring as have now. Can plug your router in for wireless access.k. Why spend money on this when there are other needs in town?

- i. This has opportunity to be self-sustaining and possibly earn some money for the town.
- **ii.** Individual addresses on boxes at each house will give exact location for 911 calls.
- **iii.** Plan to dedicate a strand of fiber to mount transmitters to fill in radio holes that currently exist. Will increase communication for emergency responders/police.
- iv. Schools are increasing dependency on internet for books, assignments, etc. Our children would be at a disadvantage without Broadband
- v. Telemedicine technology enabling elderly to live at home longer.
